


Roger Kerry Coast to Coast walk (192 miles) completed in 2011 it was with some trepidation that I joined a couple of my friends from our Austrian walking group to complete the famous Coast to Coast walk 18 months ago. Whilst I am a regular long distance walker, I

This was followed by a wide and varied career and at the age of 70 he completed a research thesis and was awarded a PhD.

Graham Staley 66 - 73 made contact to say that having joined Bass in 1980, he was now working for Anheauser-Busch InBev as Head of Investor Relations.

Peter Everett 34 - 37 has reached the age of 90 and recalled that he played rugby for the school and what a 'wonderful school' it was.

Jeffrey Matkin 50 - 55....... took retirement in 1993 after working in various companies. Since then he has enjoyed travelling, especially on cruise ships! He would like to hear from anyone in 5A (1953) and 5X (1954). He reports on fond memories of cricket with Bass and Rugby with BRFC and mentions coaches Vic Roebuck, Spadge Mayger and Dave Bowen.

Duncan Bradley 62 - 68: yes, it is true.... after 40 years in teaching, I am retiring! I will have been in my current post as Director of Music at the Gregg School in Southampton for 101 terms. I am currently studying Theology and hopefully, in October 2013, will be licensed by the Bishop of Winchester as a Reader in the Church of England. My wife Margaret will also be retiring this July, again after 40 years half of them as Headteacher of Banister Infants' School in Southampton. Although I am retiring from teaching, I will still maintain my contact with education as an examiner with Edexcel and (hopefully) as a lay chaplain to the school. Just to add insult to injury, someone at school has "stitched" me up for the Hampshire teacher of the year award for which I have been shortlisted. I really cannot think why as I'm just an ordinary chap doing an ordinary job teaching children!

Alan Marshall 48 - 55...... I would really appreciate contact with old friends. My only claim to fame would be the fact that I left Burton Grammar three times and went back twice. In 1953 I took five 'O' levels, but only passed two, so I went back at the start of the next year and managed to pass three more. (Stuart Haywood was a great friend since our Junior School days at Newhall). I made the big mistake of not working as hard as I should have done. My first attempt at the Sandhurst exam resulted in a failure by what amounted to one third of a per cent,



so greatly encouraged I returned to the school again and repeated the exams, this time successfully. The Officers' Selection Board found I was red / green colour blind, which ended my ambition of becoming an officer, so I served three years in the ranks, mostly in Cyprus during the Emergency, then left the army and became a teacher, a fact which I have regretted ever since. In 1964 I committed Holy Matrimony and emigrated to Australia, spending two years in Tasmania, then moving to Perth, Western Australia where I have been ever since.

Andrew Fawkes 59 - 67

Andrew sent us this pictures of the Annual Dinner/Dance held in 1966. He remarks there was a School 'Role of Honour' which used to sit in the foyer of the Winshill School next to the entrance door to the school hall. The pages were changed very occasionally, but more than often it was left open at the page showing George Cooper's achievements. It just so happened that it was also the same page where my Uncle Wilfrid's name appeared, since they were in the same class together.



What struck me as very odd whenever I viewed the page was that dear old George must have been at BGS as 'Man & Boy' for more than 50 years! He also appears in the picture.

Peter Rose 58 - 65 it was Peter who wrote to us to report the death of his uncle, Michael Rose. He tells us that he spent a very enjoyable and exciting lifetime in scientific research, For that, he thanks Norman Jones, Ezra Somekh, and Brab Smith for providing the initial inspiration and excellent grounding. He retired in 2007 after being Scientific Director of the UK research centre Sanofi-Aventis. This encouraged him to develop his French and the hopes ET Ward and Mrs Radford would be impressed with his late improvements in the language! He believes that exciting times lie ahead for the biological sciences and he hopes that future generations will not discount careers in science quite so readily. He now lives in Northumberland and retains an active interest in the field ornithology and beekeeping.

Derrick Pounds 46 - 51 ... I have been sailing about twice every week since June. Our sailing days this summer involved, each time, about 3 hours on the lake usually going out 4 miles due south, using a pile of rocks, where a large colony of cormorants nest and rest, as the turning point. We also see fish, including large Muskie, jumping straight up out of the water usually well away from our boat. In October, we took our sailboat out of the water using our trailer, had its

hull pressure washed to remove numerous zebra mussels, took the mast down and tightly covered everything with a heavy duty PVC tarp for storage until the next sailing season that starts next May. In March I spent two weeks 'working' in Ireland on the Allowdale farms near Kanturk & Buttevant erecting electric fences. We visited Clifden where in June 1919





aviators Alcock & Brown landed their Vickers Vimy open cockpit bi-plane. They had spent fourteen-and-a-half hours over the North Atlantic crossing the coast at 4.28pm, having flown 1890 miles Kindest regards and hearty congratulations on the BGOBA communications

I thought you might be interested in reading a letter that my father, Walter Pounds M.M., wrote home to his parents living in Newton Solney. In a letter dated 26/6/16 he wrote from hospital after fighting with the Royal Artillery Garrison .near Ypres

Dear Mother, I am quite safe after the Battle we had last week. ... I can tell you we have had a hot time of it and lost 600 yards of trenches but I think we have got most of them back again for the Artillery shelled them out of it.

We had the order to get back the whole of the 17 miles. We had to walk at a fast rate and the whole of the way it poured with rain. When we got to our position we were like drowned rats. We have only had one night in bed this week and then we had to sleep fully dressed they ... We are expecting another clash any day now but I think we shall hold them.



Walter's Medals

We have had several air raids this last day. We had 10 German planes over this morning and have had plenty of fighting in the air as well as down below. It is a devil out here for mud lately but today sunny. I only wish it would keep like it for a week or so. I am fed up with the life out here. It is a regular tramp's life as we have no fires to have a warm by but we keep on smiling as long as we are doing our bit for the country. It makes you feel rather sorry for this country; the fields around our guns are just like a quarry for it is full of shell holes. We have had a few of our lads killed and others died of wounds but I think it lucky for any of us to be alive.

Our position is just outside the town of Ypres. We are about 50 yards from the main Calais road of which the Germans have so many times to get. If we let them through here they would have a straight run to Calais but they have something to do to get through though we had a job hold them the other week. So just look out for an attack around Ypres and Hill 60 because I will be in them. Must now close. Hoping this finds you all well as it leaves me, in the best.

In 2010 he wrote a major piece to commemorate 140 years of Derbyshire CCC. He also delivered a speech to the Burton Civic Society at their golden anniversary dinner when he spoke about

- * He mentions his best friend Alan Marshall. who emigrated to Australia 50 years ago. He last saw Alan in 1953 and tells us that Alan is planning a trip to the UK in 2013. (cf. page 8!)
- * He was sad to learn of the death of Geoff Nicholson, whom he says was a man 'devoid of rancour and always of a sunny disposition.'



Mike Newbury 42 - 50On leaving the School, I worked as a pupil for Norman Townsend, Chartered Surveyor and a former BGS pupil, of the Burton firm of C.J. Townsend & Son, took a Degree in Rural Estate Management at St Catharine's College, Cambridge, then did National Service. In 1956, I joined the Inland Revenue Valuation Office, Scotland, working from Inverness, where I married Pat Stokes, a former pupil of Burton Girls High School, and we have 3 children (all academics) and 3 grandchildren. Bernard attended the Burton Grammar School where, apparently, he sometimes got into mischief! On one occasion, during a cross-country run he hid under the Ferry Bridge and waited for the class to double back. On leaving school he joined Bass as a wages clerk and retired at the age of 50. He was a keen table tennis and lawn tennis player. He was also a keen traveller and was interested in all modes of transport; he tried piloting a small plane, gliding, flying in a microlight and sailing in a small submarine! His last trip was a cruise around the Isle of Wight in a paddle steamer. He

never learned to drive but his biggest passion was railways. He was a private, generous man with a dry sense of humour who enjoyed the company of others.

Keith Hornby-Priestnall 38-42 Died February 2013

Keith died the day before we were due to print this Newsletter and a full obituary will be published in the next Newsletter.













Roy Adams (40 - 46) Died November 2011

Roy taught at Clitheroe Grammar School from 1953 to 1985. He was known as Dinky Adams because he was the smallest boy and lived at 160 Calais Road in Burton. Roy devoted the whole of his working life to Clitheroe Royal Grammar School where he quickly became one of the outstanding personalities on the staff and was always a lively and stimulating teacher. Despite all the demands of school, he was no less a family man, who made sure of being there for his wife, Margery, and their three children, and later, for the grandchildren who adored him. Friends and colleagues say "Roy was a man of great integrity, who demanded high standards of himself and expected it in others, but all was done with careful consideration and a lively sense of humour, which endeared him to colleagues and pupils alike.



Ken Parkin (BGS staff during the 1950's) Died March 2012

(From his widow Audrey)After leaving Sheffield University, Ken became a teacher of geography at the BGS. After six years he decided on a career change and studied to become a chartered accountant and later met his wife Audrey. They had a son, John, and Ken often enjoyed sharing football, cricket and golf with him.

Ken had a happy retirement, enjoying the Peak District, golf, Philharmonic concerts and walking. He lived to see three grandchildren, who between them, completed his happiness.



Michael Rose 37 - 46 Died March 2010

Michael was the son of JF Rose who was president of the Association in 56/57. On leaving school he did his National Service and then joined Bass for what was to become a lifelong employment. He played rugby for BRFC, was a keen oarsmen, a passionate horseman and he hunted with the Meynell Hunt. He bred horses all his adult life and he supported his wife June with her own horse and show jumping interests. He retired from Bass in 1973 and then moved to Eire where he continued his interest in breeding horses.

Don Sharratt 33 - 38 Died January 2013

Don started life at Ind Coope and gained a Diploma in brewing. In 1942 he was accepted into the Navy Air Crew on HMS Indefatigable. He reached the rank of Lieutenant and was Mentioned in Dispatches. He married in 1948 and was a devoted family man to the subsequent family. His interests were Round Table and tennis and in later years, he threw himself into voluntary work.

His granddaughter, Julia, sent this message from Australia "I'm sorry I can't be there to say goodbye and celebrate your wonderful life but just know that wherever I am, I am thinking of you right now and I know that wherever I go you'll be watching and keeping me safe. We will see the world together now. I love you Grandpa,



Harry Edwin Smith Died 24th May 2012

Seventeen Old Boys added to a packed church at Harry's funeral on the 12th June 2012.

Harry was born in Taunton and whilst at school came under the influence of a teacher who instilled in him a love of maths. Before he could take up his University place in 1940, Harry found himself in the Royal Artillery and saw active service with the 21st Anti-tank Regiment in both North Africa and Sicily. He was to suffer shellshock which caused him to lose the hearing on his left side.

He eventually completed his degree at London University and joined Burton Grammar School in 1949, teaching mathematics, physics and chemistry. In1953 he moved to Derby Technical College and enjoyed the links he made with local industry, working with companies such as Midland Rail and Rolls-Royce. In 1958 he was invited back to the newly opened building in Winshill where he began to again teach maths, setting the highest academic standards and seeing his pupils achieve considerable success. Harry was never happy with the move to comprehensive education which he described as "one of the greatest howlers the government has ever made" and he became deeply frustrated in his final years at the school.



In 1971 his wife Helen was killed in a car accident and he mourned her for over seven years, before in 1978 meeting Dianne Bates, an English teacher at the Girl's High School, who was to become his second wife. Harry was a Christian who sang regularly in St Modwen's church choir, he was a sportsman who loved rugby, cricket and golf, which he played to the end and he was a gentleman in the widest sense of the term. Added to all that, he was greatly respected by pupils and parents, as well as a large circle of friends both at home and in Austria. His high and demanding standards influenced for good the lives of many.

Everyone who attended Harry's funeral was moved by the words of his son, Mike, who described his own upbringing as a privileged one where he was taught the meaning of life's values, to appreciate the worth of honesty, trust and unswerving loyalty, to be shown the fruits of the hard work ethic, and to be brought up in a household in which warmth, stability and happiness were abundant. He finished his eulogy with these words; "I can genuinely say that I couldn't have had a better father." (**Editor:** surely, there can be no greater tribute than that.)
